I was shown mercy so that in me, the worst of sinners, Christ Jesus might display his immense patience as an example for those who would believe in him and receive eternal life." (1 Timothy 1:16)

Perhaps the most famous and dramatic conversion to Christianity in history is that of St. Paul. He was going to Damascus to continue his programme of arrests in order to silence the growing Christian movement, when Jesus suddenly appeared to him in a bright light from heaven and spoke to him.

The result for a Paul (or Saul as he was known at that point) was a dramatic change of direction in life. Rather than trying to silence the message about Jesus he became one of Christ's most passionate and outspoken evangelists.

The way Paul was converted was unique. No two people come to Christ in the same way. Yet, there is a lot we can learn from this event. Let's just consider two points, that arise from the fact that before his conversion, Paul had been involved in a violent and abusive programme to silence the followers of Christ.

The first thing, to say is that this wicked behaviour was what made him 'the worst of sinners.' However, it did not disqualify him from receiving God's grace. Rather, the fact that Jesus could call someone so wicked and so anti-Christ powerfully demonstrates how amazing his grace is. No-one is beyond salvation.

Secondly, on Sunday I spoke about the fact that we live in an increasingly contested culture. However, there are different ways to 'fight' for the truth. Before Jesus called him, Paul used oppression and bullying to silence those he disagreed with. Afterwards, he used the power of persuasion and a life of perseverance through persecution and suffering. It is not just that Christians are called to contend for a different truth, but that in following the crucified and resurrected Jesus, we do so in a way that follows his example.
